## Life Stories Initiative

Attic Angel Senior Living Community has some amazing residents! To help capture and share some of their stories, we have begun a process of interviewing residents and documenting their stories, with their consent and the participation of family members. With permission from the resident and family, Attic Angel staff will also distribute an electronic/digital copy of their stories to the entire Attic Angel community. This includes residents, staff, and members of Attic Angel. The purpose of this distribution is to share more details about our residents to increase and improve social and caregiving interactions. We are excited to share the first of these stories, and hope you enjoy the memories and adventures shared:

### The Amazing Lives of Barbara & Carl Sherbeck

I, Barbara, was born on September 1, 1937, in Aurora, Illinois with older sisters, Carol and Lorraine, and a younger brother, Richard. My parents, Earl and Bernice Herren, were cattle farmers near Plainfield, Illinois. During high school, I became serious about my faith, and when I graduated in 1956, I enrolled in the Moody Bible Institute in Chicago to discover God's calling for my life. I hoped to gain biblical knowledge,



spiritual growth, and skills I would need to go wherever God lead me. As it turned out, I gained all of that and more!



I, Carl, was born July 17, 1935, in our farmhouse in the little township of Navarino, Wisconsin, northwest of Green Bay. My parents, Henry and Olga Sherbeck, were dairy farmers and appreciated my help and that of my older brother, Marvin, and younger sister, Marilyn. My "faith journey" started in elementary school and deepened in high school, leading me to enroll in Moody Bible Institute after my brother returned from military service.

We, Barbara and Carl, met at Moody Bible Institute. Barb pursued this shy young man to capture his attention. Barb and Carl became engaged and planned their wedding for the day after graduation, June 7, 1958. Carl enrolled in the Fort Wayne Bible College to complete a bachelor's degree in preparation for ministry, pastored a small church in Fox Hollow, and we began our family. Denis was born in 1959, Tim was born in 1960, and Barry was born in 1963.

We joined "The Evangelical Alliance Mission" (TEAM). In 1966, we were assigned to the United Arab Emirates (UAE). We went to the desert community of Al Ain as the first non-medical team members supporting the Oasis Hospital (now



known as Kanad Hospital), a private institution established in 1960 by American medical doctors to help address the high infant and maternal mortality rates. Carl used his construction skills to help with the hospital expansion and maintenance. Barb served in an administrative capacity with patient registration and bookkeeping. During this time, our son Steve was born in 1967. In 1970, we returned for a time to Aurora, Illinois, where our daughter Carrie was born in 1971. Between 1972 and 2003, we worked in Abu Dhabi, Al Ain, and Dubai, with periodic visits to the U.S. to maintain connections with our supporting churches and care for our family.

**1972-1977-Abu Dhabi:** We founded both English and Arabic speaking churches in our home, building community with people from a variety of cultural and denominational backgrounds.

**1977-1979-Sheboygan, WI:** Reconnected with supporting churches and provided care for Barb's father and nephews during a family transition, and Barb worked at a phone company. Remodeled and sold a house.

1979-1982-Abu Dhabi: Pastored the Arabic-language church

**1982-Madison, WI**: Short furlough to connect with supporting churches

**1982-1985-Al Ain**: Carl served as Field Chairman during a period of transition and growth at the Oasis Hospital. Barb coordinated language lessons and taught introductory Arabic to new or short-term missionaries serving at the hospital.

**1985-1987-Madison, WI:** We worked with Intervarsity Christian Fellowship, providing administrative support and counselling for students considering international ministry. Provided care for Barb's father in his declining health. Built a home for our family.

**1987-2003-Dubai**: We pastored and grew a small Arabic-language church. Carl supported getting a land grant for a new church facility in Abu Dhabi, which opened its doors in 1993. Carl facilitated a long-term development project which led to the Dubai Evangelical Church Center (DECC) opening its doors in 2003.

### Reflections on our story:

- We had a vision for how to serve our Lord, and we followed it.
- We are satisfied with what we did and what we accomplished; we have no regrets.
- Our life choices have benefited ourselves and our family.
- Our ministries made a very positive impact on the world.
- We are grateful to the Lord for the opportunities to contribute to multiple cultures.

Even in retirement, we have been blessed. We continued to live in our home in Madison for many years and were active at High Point Church. We enjoyed gardening and time with our friends and family. We even enjoyed refurbishing projects in our condominium when we moved there in 2011. Since we moved to Attic Angel in 2021, we have appreciated their support and social opportunities. Attic Angel is a wonderful place for us!

# Garden Gab: Understanding Invasives

You've likely heard of Kudzu destroying timberlands and starving livestock of pasture. But do you know what makes this plant especially destructive? It isn't actually the plant's fault at all, but instead that Kudzu is an introduced garden novelty – an exotic species with no natural predators. Its widespread use by the Soil Conservation Service in 1935 – to prevent erosion from dust storms – was particularly clever. However, the effects still linger to this day. With a growth pattern unlike most plants in the North American continent, kudzu can *outcompete* native species.

The natural process of *plant succession* continues, and soon you are left with a complete decimation of native species and a monoculture of what should've stayed as an ornamental species. Control is never that easy; if you plant it, it will grow. Plants, insects, animals, and even other organisms, such as mollusks, can become invasive when the ecological balance is disturbed. Native species live within a *community* which is always changing in composition, and these communities ensure that each role an organism fulfils is well balanced in the food chain, the carbon cycle, the water cycle, and so on. In a garden, this is known as a matrix. A stable matrix will change slowly over time (like a shrubland). Highly variable matrices may change from year to year (prairie is a great example!)

Exotic garden species, also known as *ornamentals* or *horticultural varieties*, have been linked to land-use changes, habitat destruction, and reduction of native species. Indeed the habitat loss from invasive species is second only to human development in terms of land-use changes. Natural disasters and extreme weather also account for a large share of biodiversity loss. Creating garden matrices without invasive species is the best way to create a resilient garden – one that will remain stable through climate change and support our local ecosystems and plant communities. Attic Angel's most common invasive species are the burning bush and barberry. Native alternatives, such as American bittersweet and Aronia, are being provided over time. # SustainAbility: Sustainability Committee Report

Attic Angel's Trim the Trash initiative is steadily moving forward. In the spring of 2025, the Sustainability committee conducted an audit at Attic Angel to identify locations in all of our buildings that were lacking proper recycling and trash receptacles. The result of this audit led to the purchase of a number of new recycling and trash bins, which are being placed throughout the community. If you have not already noticed the new blue recycling bins and the black trash bins throughout the buildings, you will soon. Programs, signage, and newsletter articles are being rolled out to educate residents, staff, and angels on what should be placed in recycling bins and how the items should be prepared. While local governments and environmental agencies provide overall guidance for recycling management, real change begins with each of us. As individuals, we need to be thoughtful and take responsibility for what goes in our recycling bins. Don't overlook the power of your individual actions. When everyone at Attic Angel places the correct items in our recycling bins, it creates a collective positive impact on our environment.





Did you know that in the City of Madison, almost 18.9% of what goes into recycling bins is actually trash, and about 13% of material in the Dane County landfill could be recycled? That means 26% of what we

are tossing away is going to the wrong place! When items are recycled, they are transformed into new products rather than ending up in landfills. When we recycle, we reduce waste, save energy, conserve natural resources, and reduce pollution.

Pellitteri Waste Systems collects trash and recycling here at Attic Angel. An analysis over the past five years shows that our garbage tonnage at Attic Angel Place has averaged 117.46 tons!! (Holy Cow! That's about the weight of 150 Holsteins). The Sustainability Committee will monitor this data to evaluate the effectiveness of our *Trim the Trash* initiative. Our goal, with your help, is to notice a reduction in waste tonnage, showing that our efforts to improve recycling are working!

# The New Attic Angel Sustainability Fund

At Attic Angel, we know that caring for people also means caring for the world they live in. That's why we're proud to introduce the Attic Angel Sustainability Fund, a new initiative designed to help us explore, test, and implement innovative sustainability projects for our community.

This special fund was created to honor Bjorn (Red) Thompson, whose vision and leadership shaped Attic Angel's sustainability efforts for over a decade. From commissioning the first energy audit in 2012 to spearheading water and lighting efficiencies and leading solar projects in Prairie Point, Red's work set a standard for both creativity and responsibility. His legacy of innovation is now the foundation for this new fund.

The purpose of the Sustainability Fund is simple yet powerful: to provide start-up resources for pilot projects that fall between regular budget cycles. As the committee explains, "One of the most challenging questions we face when reviewing proposals is whether continued on page 6

initiatives can be supported and remain beneficial long term. This fund allows us to test different initiatives and make recommendations to the board to make better informed decisions for Attic Angel Community."

For Jon McCarthy, a resident leader who has championed sustainability alongside Red, this fund is about ensuring good ideas have a chance to prove themselves. "In developing complex instruments or technologies, you always begin with a prototype," he explains. "The same is true here. A small investment up front can show us whether an idea will work, how it impacts residents and staff, and how it might reduce costs over time." He points to the solar projects at Prairie Point and Attic Angel Place as prime examples, noting that early pilot testing led to significant energy savings and long-term benefits.

Looking ahead, Jon sees this fund as an essential step in preparing for the future: "Attic Angel has a 135-plus-year history of caring for seniors and supporting families in Dane County. By incorporating renewable energy and waste-reduction practices, we can sustain this mission affordably, while reducing our environmental footprint. This fund will help us explore solutions that support both the planet and the people who call Attic Angel home."

Through this new fund, we celebrate Red Thompson's legacy, lift up the passion of leaders like Jon McCarthy, and invite our whole community to be part of shaping a sustainable future. Every gift to the Sustainability Fund ensures that Attic Angel can continue caring for generations to come.
